







(Ab Ed) Percentage of teacher, parent and students who agree that their learning environments are welcoming, caring, respectful and safe.

16. Students at your child's school follow the rules.






- Increased SSW time to do group supports surrounding character education and relationship dynamics (targeted boys groups / peer influences / mental health).



Successes

- Continue to see a high volume of students

- Extra support was received last school year which allowed for much more group sessions

Targeted Areas For Improvement

- Introduce new staff to Carmen and her role to ensure students are still being referred when needing support
- Continuing to incorporate our SSW team in conflict resolution skills with students as our results show that students to student relationships are not positive
- Using newly gained funding to help support students impacted by trauma and addictions

We have DAILY breakfast for ALL students which is buffet style (Cereal, toast, smoothies, eggs, cheese, yogurt, fruit etc.) including daily snacks in every classroom located in grab bins / in the office to support hungry students. We also have a lunch program for students who do not have a lunch.

Successes

- We have continued to receive funding from our three providers
- We have food accessed by ALL students
- Lunches are given away to students in need daily
- Staff who recognize there is a larger need are able to access additional snacks / food support for their students
- Positive connections with the youth center who come in 2 times a week to help with breakfast programming (smoothies)

Targeted Areas For Improvement

- More opportunities for a hot meal in the AM
- Alternative snacks more often (meat / cheese / crackers vs a granola bar)







(Ab Ed) Percentage of teachers, parents and students satisfied with the overall quality of basic education.

(AB Ed) Percentage of students in grade 12 meeting or exceeding the Acceptable Standard on Diploma Exams. (AEAM DATA)







(WCPS) Observed reduction of chronic absenteeism as reported by schools amongst First Nations, Métis and Inuit students. (AEAM DATA)






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








(AB Ed) Percentage of teachers, parents and students who agree that students have access to the appropriate supports and services at school.
